Lead Coordinator Report

2024 has been an active year for the Digital Waitaha Charitable Trust. Our successes include expanding in-person programs, improving our online presence, developing productive partnerships, and making significant progress in research. We are particularly proud of the Web Wise Wanderers online course and expanding the STOP, BLOCK & TALK (SBT) digital wellbeing and safety program into Christchurch and North Canterbury. These achievements are a significant leap forward in advancing our mission to promote digital safety and wellbeing.



Key Achievements:



In-Person Programmes

Our STOP, BLOCK & TALK (SBT) program continues to thrive, reaching a significant milestone by expanding into Christchurch and Kaiapoi. Kaiapoi High School students have exceeded expectations, demonstrating leadership by delivering sessions to younger peers.

Due to time constraints and a growing demand, we recognised the pressing need for a new coordinator. This role will support the execution of these sessions in schools and community groups. While our collaboration with Safer Mid Canterbury and other organizations continues, many opportunities remain untapped.

Additionally, we have delivered our new Digital Shield program to several local nonprofits and community groups.

The Collaborative Trust is interested in delivering our programmes across Christchurch and beyond.

Online Programmes

We are in the process of developing the Web Wise Wanderers course, with three videos already filmed and edited: the STOP, BLOCK & TALK introduction, "Bullying," and "Darling, There is Nobody Like Me" (body image). A third video on Roblox scams has been filmed but is still in development. Currently, we are gathering student feedback to ensure the videos are engaging and relevant. The Year 0-8 course is scheduled for launch next year.

To complete the final two films—one on addiction and the other on digital footprint and consent—we are seeking additional funding.

Research and Development

Substantial data was collected from various schools, and a focus group is scheduled for October. Ethics approval from the University of Canterbury allows us to continue our work, and we anticipate several peer-reviewed papers to emerge from this data. The findings will guide the future of our programmes, ensuring they remain evidence-based and impactful.



Youth Programmes and Initiatives

The Digital Ambassadors programme continues to be a cornerstone of our in-class school sessions. These primarily Year 5-8 ambassadors are critical in reinforcing the STOP, BLOCK & TALK strategy. Their peer-led learning environment, leadership and authenticity resonate with younger students. This approach fosters both engagement and empowerment.

This year saw the success of the Web Wise Wellness Expo at Te Whare Whakate Ashburton Library. Our youth podcasts, funded by DECA, have gained momentum, and we look forward to expanding this platform next year.

Future Goals and Conclusion



Keeping youth safe online

STOP, BLOCK & TALK are three words that Digital Waitaha (DW) lead facilitator Neysa Koizumi hopes will effortlessly roll off young peoples tongues when they think about digital wellbeing and safety.

Our Lady of the Snow Year 6 student Maivelle recently designed a new cover for DW Little Orange youth workbook on digital wellbeing and safety. For her efforts she and her school received a financial prize.

The Little Orange book for youth, and the Little Blue book for parents, is available through schools and Citizens Advice Bureau at Community House.

The Little Orange book covers a variety of topics to assist young people to keep safe when using digital platforms and to protect their digital footprint. The workbooks are used by students when DW goes into local schools. Young people "engage in interactive sessions where they read about a topic, practice what they have learnt, look at strategies on how to use the knowledge they have gained and answer questions to ensure they understand what they have learnt."

The parents handbook provides them with conversation starters so they can talk to their youth about "things like scams, cyber bullying, body images, what data they put online and personal information online", Neysa said. DW wanted a short punchy easy to remember catch phrase and so **STOP**, **BLOCK & TALK** was chosen.

Stop, "Walking away from something they see online and don't like,

Block the user, if you can report the user, take screen shots.

& Talk. Talk to a trusted adult like a teacher, caregiver or someone else they trust about what was the issue is."

The programme is proving successful and they are getting support from sponsors and the schools they are working with in Mid Canterbury.

DW works closely with schools to encourage students to manage their own digital footprint and well-being, "to help them protect themselves from hackers and scammers."

DW are engaging digital ambassadors from among the students who have already been through the programme to be there for others in their schools and help with the programme in schools.

"We need to be teaching them how to keep safe online and in control of their online data and footprint."

Chronicles Report

Children should be taught to navigate the digital world the same way they are taught to cross the road, Digital Waitaha says.

Lead coordinator Neysa Koizumi said 'stop, block, and talk' is a digital safety strategy they have developed that every child should learn when they get a digital device

"We didn't wait until our kids were almost hit by a bus to teach them to cross the road safely.

"We absolutely cannot continue to let our kids use devices without digital safety strategies.

A presentation to the Ashburton District Council last week detailed how they are teaching the strategy in schools across the district.

Stop, block, and talk is the online safety version of slip, slop, slap that advises people to stop engaging with the negative content, block the source, and talk to an adult.

The organisation also runs a parent programme to equip adults to help their children in a rapidly advancing technological world.

It's all new technology and new challenges, Koizumi said.

"This is the first time ever that our young people aren't able to have the wisdom of our elders.

"We need to go to our young people to get the wisdom so that we can turn around and help them."

Ashburton Mayor Neil Brown described the presentation as eye-opening.

He asked if there was an app or program to stop the exposure to unwanted material and messages.

While there are layers of protection available, there is no way to stop it, Koizumi said.

"There are no kids growing up in isolation anymore."

Digital Waitaha acting chair Megan Rutter presented the eye-opening statistic that by the time a girl "is in Y7 she has already seen a dick pic" if they have Snapchat.

The "normalisation of nudes" is now common in younger children, Koizumi said.

"If I'm saying the word penis in here and if I'm making any people feel uncomfortable, I can tell you our kids are talking about it in a way that they are very comfortable about, so we have to be the adults in the room.

"These kids are normalising these conversations so we need to get out in front of it to make sure these kids don't feel shame and we are averting mental health issues because we are empowering them beforehand."

To help in their efforts to spread the digital safety message, Digital Waitaha wants to host a youth event at Te Whare Whakatere, Ashburton's library and civic centre, in June.

The event would cover some of the dangers of social media and digital devices as well as provide online safety strategies.

It is aimed at youth, from primary age right up to secondary school, as well as their parents and caregivers, and anyone that works with youth, Koizumi said.


